# 10 eco-friendly alcohol brands to know, and what makes them sustainable 

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#### Abstract

- Alcohol production can be pretty taxing on old mother earth. Carbon dioxide output, nitrate and phosphate runoff, water overusage; the list goes on.


- It can also be extremely tough on workers involved in the production process - just read "Grapes of Wrath," or tour a vineyard town - and you'll quickly realize that employee health and safety violations are still very much alive in the 21st century.
- Here are a few of our favorite alcohol brands working to move the ball forward for the environment and for industry workers.


El Tesoro

El Tesoro Tequila composts all of its organic waste and lets $5 \%$ of its crop flower to make way for the lesser long-nosed bat, an endangered pollinator of agave plants.

El Tesoro Tequila, which is made by La Alteña Distillery, is produced organically and all of the byproducts of the process are composted. Now, that's not so unique - another very fine tequila, Casa Noble, is also certified organic and additive-free - but El Tesoro's eco-aware agave-harvesting practices really set it apart.

Some quick background info: most of today's agave is cloned, and it's harvested before it's able to reproduce. This leaves the agave gene pool with little to no diversity and an ever-weakening fortitude, which is risky business for an industry that relies so heavily on the plant. A single plague could potentially wipe out agave altogether.
In order to ensure future crops and save the endangered lesser longnosed bat, which pollinates agave plants, El Tesoro Master Distiller Carlos Camarena pledged to allow at least $5 \%$ of the distillery's crops to flower. It's kind of a win-win, but it's an exceptionally sweet victory for nature.

The agave is also roasted more slowly than it is at many other distilleries, offering a noticeably smoother finish, even for the nonaged blanco at the bottom end of the brand's portfolio.
